The Student Government Association (SGA) survey was sent out to 5,477 undergraduate students from January 30 – February 15, 2014. This report documents findings of analyses conducted with data gathered from 1277 (23% response rate) traditional undergraduates at Azusa Pacific University (APU). This survey lends insight into a variety of aspects of students' experiences including the type of advising support they receive, their campus experience, their educational experience, and the social and spiritual support they receive.

The principal investigators were: Jordan Williams, SGA President and Amber Fields, SGA Vice President.

Due to the wide range of topics that were explored, and the relatively large number of analyses that were conducted, selected findings are presented below followed by a brief narrative on key findings.

The Key findings are organized into four categories: Advising and Support; Campus Experience; Educational Experience; and Social and Spiritual Support. The reader is encouraged to consult the table and figures in this report for more detail regarding subjects of interest.

Key Findings:

Advising and Support

- Eighty (80%) percent of participants either agreed or strongly agreed that they were aware of the counseling services provided by APU (Table 24).
- Sixty-one (61%) percent of participants either agreed or strongly agreed that they feel comfortable going to the Health Center for health concerns (Table 24).

• Campus Experience:

- The top five reasons in rank order that gave participants a sense of belonging at APU were Academics/Major, Time spent with friends in living areas, Faculty and Staff, Time spent with friends in eating areas, and Chapel (Table 3).
- Seventy-five (75%) of participants rated the overall events of Communiversity as either average or good (Table 17).
- Seventy-nine (79%) of participants rated student union building (Cougar Dome) as either average or good (Table 17).
- Sixty-eight (68%) percent of participants lived on campus (Table 18).
- Seventy-nine (79%) percent of participants were either satisfied or very satisfied with campus security being provided for on campus housing (Table 19).
- Sixty-seven (67%) percent of participants agreed or strongly agreed that they believe it is important to have a student government at APU (Table 26).

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• Educational Experience

- Ninety-three (93%) percent of participants were able to register for the general educational classes this academic year (Table 5).
- Ninety-two (92%) percent participants either agreed or strongly agreed that they intend to graduate from APU (Table 4).
- Eighty-seven (87%) percent of participants either agreed or strongly agreed that the classes for their major challenged them academically (Table 8).
- Sixty-one (61%) percent of participants either agreed or strongly agreed that the general education classes challenged them academically (Table 8).
- Sixty-five (65%) percent of participants said that it is important for APU to require professors to use an online grading system (Table 9).
- Ninety (90%) percent of participants were either satisfied or very satisfied with the amount of learning in their classes at APU (Table 7).

• Social and Spiritual Support

- Eighty-five (85%) percent of participants were either satisfied or very satisfied that their professors encouraged and facilitated their personal spiritual growth in the classroom (Table 7).
- Sixty-six (66%) percent of participants either agreed or strongly agreed that they were informed about ministry and service opportunities (Table 11).
- Eighty-two (82%) percent of participants said that they have never or rarely experienced discrimination because of their gender (Table 25).
- Eighty-four (84%) percent of participants said that they have never or rarely experienced discrimination because of their race/ethnicity (Table 25).
- Eighty-six (86%) percent of participants said that they have never or rarely experienced discrimination because of their religion (Table 25).
- Ninety-five (95%) percent of participants said that they have never or rarely experienced discrimination because of their sexual orientation (Table 25).

Dr. ***** should win many awards for being a great person teacher and role model

Everything has been great! My teachers have been awesome

Everything is pretty good, I wish that getting all the classes I need was a little easier.

For a few classes only one professor teaches it, and sometimes classes are only offered once every other year. All the professors are great in speaking encouragement and about Jesus openly.

Great!

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*****, *****, and ***** have taught me more than many other professors here at APU.

I'm just a little unsatisfied with the fact that in my major, being really small, we do not offer multiple times for a class. This means that when signing up for classes we only have one choice and we have to take it because it's for our major. I guess there really isn't anything to be done about this though because the only way to get more class time options would be for there to be more people in the major. It's just a little annoying having no control over when you get to take your classes.

I always get the classes I need but It's hard when there is only one course open for that semester. I've had some great professors and some really bad professors which made me question how they were hired or made me question if they were even Christians. But overall I have learned a TON being here at APU!

I am a business major and I wish there was more conversations about how to use business in ministry. The majority of the undergraduate perspective seems to be favoring starting your own business and working in the corporate world. I am also dissatisfied with the limited Honors classes and the lack of an Honors dynamic or presence in that major.

I am a Liberal Studies major and I have not been in a single class that has taught me anything about how to be a good teacher except for advanced composition with Dr. *****.

I am a nursing major, and I have learned so much through those classes, unfortunately, there are very few times that these classes are available.

I am a nursing major therefore all my classes are always offered to me. Many professors here poor into the students spiritually.

I am in the nursing program at the High Desert campus, they sign us up for the classes we need.

I am in the School of Business, and I have experienced so many incredible professors to learn from. But the biggest difficulty for me is that I feel like I have very little practical skills of business, and more definitions. I also believe there is too much emphasis placed on Corporate rather than Entrepreneurial businesses and organizations. The School of Business has been just what I needed though.

I am studying at Oxford University right now, and I am realizing the value in going deeper with a topic, rather than covering more ground. Looking back over the courses studied, I have very little recall or knowledge of what was learned because I maybe only spent a day or two on a book/author/topic. The fast pace does not ensure more learning, but rather a more shallow learning of many more topics instead of deeper understanding of fewer topics--for which I prefer. The fast pace does not meet the standards of exceptional learning. I am very grateful for the experience I have been given, but I do believe there is still room for improvement and growth.

I am usually able to get the classes I need after some trouble, and my professors encourage growth but not spiritual growth, thankfully.

I chose professors based on reviews on ratemyprofessor.com. I chose professors that were rated moderately difficult and ensured learning.

I feel like the majority of things I have learned in the communication field has all been self-taught through reading. Professors rely on heavy discussion so they don't actually have to teach the students

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the material they are paid to teach.

I feel that APU's standard of professors facilitating students' spiritual growth is stressed to the point that, in some courses, it seems to be an artificial and useless component of the classroom.

I feel that the people, including all of the staff and professors, at APU are truly invested in the lives of the students and want to see them succeed in the best way.

I have always been able to get into the classes that I need and the professors have been fantastic:)

I have had excellent nursing professors who have strengthened my physical knowledge of the profession and spiritual journey in understanding gods calling for me in this field.

I have had some trouble getting into general studies classes and classes for my major. Some professors have really encouraged my spiritual growth and some have not.

I have loved everything about APU!

I have never had a problem getting classes for my major... I have only been encouraged to grow spiritually maybe once in my 3 years here... I don't feel inadequate in any area that I've taken a class in.

I have often had trouble getting classes for the Communication Studies major at the appropriate times. For instance, I had to wait to take COMM 203 until I was at a senior status, even though I should have been able to take it my sophomore year. Also, I had to get special permission to join a Senior Seminar class for my major because they all filled up before I had time to register, even as a second semester senior.

I love all my classes!

I love APU. You get as much as you put into APU

I love the community in APU, and student faculty relationships.

I love the professors. They know you by name and are always willing to pray for you.

I put satisfied because I know I could learn more in each class if teachers would teach how to do the material than for us figuring it out on our own or in groups

I think there's a problem when I have to be waitlisted for a class for my major.

I was very satisfied with professors like Dr. **** who challenged me to engage the course material from a Christian perspective.

I wish more Sociology elective classes were offered.

I wish my professors would incorporate faith more often. Some are very good at it but others just throw it in an assignment and never discuss it again.

I wish some of the upper division math classes were provided more frequently.

I would prefer class time to be used for the appropriate subject matter. Religion is all well and good, but I often feel like I have wasted money on classes that will not help me for anything in the real world.

Just class selections are limited to begin with or so it seems right now.

Lots of my upper division emphasis specific classes only had one option each semester that could easily

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conflict with other classes.

Love the psyc professors!

Most of my upper-division major classes have been very satisfying, while many of my general studies courses did not seem nearly as challenging as they might have been. In other words, I feel that some (into to art, public communication, health, etc) general studies courses could have involved much more challenge and learning than they did.

My classes have been awesome

My major classes have been horribly dissatisfying.

My major has classes at inconvenient times

My major is tiny - no need to be wait listed for my classes.

My professors challenge me and at the same time hold me accountable; they care for students and understand life situations. They all portray some type of Christian background and a lot of them even pray before class.

Not challenged

Not teaching the second half of chemistry in the fall is an injustice. I had to wait a full semester. My professor was not great Dr. ***** and it is 3rd week of school and I'm lost. the science professors take great pleasure in making their exams HARD, but during lectures they rush trying to cram a lot in. the PTLT doesn't help if the TA didn't have the same professors and usually it turns out to be a discussion of residence life. some of us are commuters and we don't fit in with cliques, so the discussions are a waste of time. the learning enrichment center sometimes doesn't have (cell bio) tutors for all of the science classes. you take pride in being difficult, but you unfairly leave a lot of us in a disadvantage.

Nursing classes are available because of the program

Over all the Professors in the Business School have been fantastic. However, ***** - Accounting II was the worst professor I have ever had in any school. Smart and knowledgeable but has no clue how to teach.

Professors should focus more on sparking conversation and talking about the material, rather than talking at students and testing them on information. It would be helpful for professors to maybe start to instigate a new kind of classroom setting and testing.

Psych classes are majority offered from 12-5. I am an athlete and that is always my practice time so I usually go late to practice or leave class early.

Required accounting courses that go from 730pm till 1030pm take away from getting the most out of these crucial classes

Satisfied all around. Though disagreements flood the pith of me.

Science department goes above and beyond to challenge us and create a learning environment that also incorporated the background of Faith!

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Some classes do not have times that work well with athletes and cause problems showing up to practice late. All of the professors I have had have been incredible in their ways of teaching and are very approachable.

Some of my classes have been excellent, thought provoking, and challenging. However, the majority of my business core classes have been basic, surface level classes. I've definitely learned a lot in my major, but I feel that many classes did not delve very deep into the subject.

Some of the general education classes are way too difficult; especially if you aren't good at the subject, the professors expect so much from you. In addition, I understand the importance of taking the Bible classes; however, if you are not a biblical studies major these classes will not help you in graduate school. I understand taking the classes; however, they require an insane amount of homework.

Some professors I have learned almost nothing from because they simply are not good teaching. They're very helpful for real life issues but as far as the academics, some are far under par.

Sometimes I feel like I learn a lot, but then other classes I just barely learn anything. I learned more about the bible from my art class than my bible classes.

Some upper division classes are only offered one section.

the amount of investment professors put into their students is amazing

The availability of classes for my major isn't all that well (AES) and because of my grade point avg., I can't take as many classes.

The available lit classes are very disappointing. Other friends I have attending other schools have a very diverse selection of literature classes to choose from.

The graphic design program is very limited. It's still an incredibly submajor in comparison to other majors. They don't teach you what you really need to be a graphic designer. A lot of the skills I learned were outside of class and by researching for myself. With the amount I'm paying for this school I really hoped to be more educated in this field.

The majority of my professors really invest in me and are about me personally. Several have met with me outside of class or invited me to their house. They integrate faith seamlessly and relate it to my major.

Again as a Spanish major I am able to get close to my teachers easily since it is a smaller major.

APU already doesn't know how to handle the growing student body, so making admissions more rigorous would give them time to figure that out.

APU has been easier than high school was for me. Perhaps this is because I'm a music major, and music is my strong suit. But at the same time, the expectations are rather low, and some students complain about having to write two papers for philosophy class for the SEMESTER, when other universities ask for 6 or so, at least. APU needs to be more academically strenuous.

APU is known for our "morals," not necessarily our academics. This is embarrassing.

APU is too easy

APU needs to up the academic rigor of general education classes as well as their GPA requirements in general.

APU seems to let in just about anyone who is willing to pay. To strengthen our academic rankings, they should be more selective.

APU should be open to people, but they should also be selective because they do not want to lose the relationship

APU should definitely make it harder to get in. This would increase the value of our degrees significantly.

At first I was a psychology major, but I didn't find the classes to be particularly challenging, which is why I switched to social work.

Classes are both challenging and engaging.

Depending on the professor, I am able to have a relationship with them. Some are not as approachable as others, though.

Despite the difficulty, the professors make themselves consistently available for personal assistance in studying.

Don't turn people away like a club with a line out the door trying to make people want in more.

Down with the general studies. At 21 years old, I don't need to take PE (and a whole bunch of other GE courses). I'll go to Triad, thanks. The GE classes are very watered down and a general waste of time - nobody wants to be there. Get rid of health, too. The curriculum is outdated. I don't need to learn the food pyramid AGAIN, but I would like some help on something useful like taxes or insurance. I would also like to see more high school classes to be accepted for credit (ie. I took a full year of competition level speech and debate in high school, which was more difficult than my GE communications class).

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Gen eds are silly to me because they are very easy and often need only common sense (this excludes bible classes)

General Ed classes sometimes just feel like time wasters.

General requirements: I transferred in to apu with many of my general studies courses completed. The ones I have had to take have not been very challenging to me, however I hold myself at a higher academic standard than the majority of my peers. Admissions requirements: People will make their choice of school based on what is best for them. I'm graduating this May. APU can make whatever changes they deem fit. Personally, all the general ed course I had to take were a complete waste of time.

I am able to develop relationships with the professors in my major, but it also depends on the personality of my professors and whether it be the type i get along with. Nursing classes are very academically challenging and with GE studies some classes, like bible classes are challenging. I think APU is a prestigious school. There will always be students who try harder than others.

I am a nursing major so it is fairly easy to develop relationships with professors and be challenged in class. My general studies classes were challenging because they were Honors classes, but the non-honors general studies classes I have taken have not been very challenging.

I am not sure if APU necessarily should make admissions requirements more difficult for incoming students. I feel as though this university provides a unique atmosphere that honors God, and I think that this school should keep their mind open to those who are interested.

If you want to take hard, challenging courses, they are available. I am grateful to be in an inclusive environment that accepts students who might not be the most academically inclined, and provides opportunities for growth.

I have had great experiences in being about to reach out to my professors.

I honestly think major classes do not need more material in order to increase difficulty, but instead a more thought-provoking environment with harder to answer questions and essay topics to help stretch the mind.

I know people who didn't even finish the application and got in. That's terrible.

I like that the university is generally accepting atmosphere. This is a Christian university and I'm sick of hearing other students bash our values. Go to a public school or some other univ. then.

I love and cherish how accessible each of my professors are, and I have been challenged academically throughout my 4 years at APU.

I love the classes I have had here, and I dont think there is much that should change about them.

In regards to admission requirements, I don't know if raising the requirements would necessarily make it that the University would become more prestigious. Someone may not have the best requirements but still be a very good student in college. HS grades I don't think are always good predictors of College academic achievement. However, I think we should have more students who have demonstrated their desire to learn, grow, and to reach the community. I also think more interviews would be a great step as

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well.

In the nursing program, GEs don't really compare to that at all in toughness. Too many people get accepted to APU now.

I strongly believe there should be a general bible course as opposed to taking a UBBL course which is required for ministry majors.

I think a well-rounded community is always beneficial. once it's super hard to get into APU, the academics will become more competitive and one of the reason I chose APU was because of the relaxed and help each other environment that APU offers

I think it is in the best interest of APU to allow a diverse community of students to enjoy the experience of going to school at APU. Sometimes the C student can make a big difference and you are only limiting the potential for these students to be at APU and become difference makers along with the A/B students!

I think nursing classes conflict so much with general requirements!!!

I think our uniquely Christian worldview as a university should strive for academic excellence in the standards it holds its students to but shouldn't raise the expectations with the purpose of increasing academic prestige. However, there is something to be said for wanting to be academically excellent as a means of bringing glory to God through the exercising of our intellect.

I think that the courses that I took challenged me in ways to be a critical thinker and apply my intellect in various circumstances

I think the classes can be a little too demanding considering that the majority of students are taking at least 3 other classes

I think the general studies classes are too difficult. For example, I know a lot of my friends who are intelligent, but got a C in philosophy because the professor made it so difficult. If it's not a major class, then they shouldn't be so difficult. Having a challenging class is good to a point, but then the general education classes just bring down your GPA and its now harder to get into graduate school. The university is supposed to be a small school with a small amount of people in the classroom. Now it's just hard to get classes because there are so many people at this school.

I think the level of "challenging" characteristics in my classes has been "about right." A few classes were easier than others, but in general I'd say that the academics were challenging in a good way.

I think the University is great in academics

It is a running joke at my high school that if you can't get in anywhere else APU will always accept you because they want the money.

It seems like anyone is able to get into APU these days. I chose the school because it was a somewhat small school, but it is becoming too big. Parking especially is not anything to look forward to.

It would be nice to have general studies classes that students care about, so making the requirements for admission harder would benefit that well.

It would seem unfair to increase the rigor of admissions due to the diversity of skills/difficulties unique

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to each major. To paint in such broad brushstrokes seems foolish, and at best somewhat disconnected from reality. For example, the strength of admissions components (traditionally the SAT/ACT, GPA, and an essay or two) for a nursing student would differ vastly from an art major or even a computer science major, while in most cases all the admissions criteria would (very) inaccurately measure the student's aptitude for actual major coursework. As the admissions requirements stand now (fairly easy), they seem to measure only a baseline interest in academics, which seems reasonable. In my opinion, the best way to increase academic prestige would be too deeply motivate students to learn starting with their freshman year (as is what happens when students study in the High Sierra program), rather than by requiring greater performance in high school (which would change very little in the actual academic life, I think--especially if one reads accounts of what actual goes on among underclassmen at lvy league schools etc).

I would be nervous to deny more students admission based on academics because our school offers so much more than just academics.

I would love it if we showed others than Christian isn't synonymous with ignorant.

I would not be here if the standards were ridiculously high, so I think if God wants someone to go to a good Christian school, we should accept them.

I would strongly agree that admission requirements should be harder but then people might view the school as a snobby Christian institution.

Love them!

Making admissions requirements harder means that students with connections will get in easier, which means less diversity.

Most classes are interesting and the higher the level in a specific course, the more challenging the course tends to be.

Most of my professors have been extremely open and friendly, and their curriculum is constantly challenging me to learn and improve my worldview, especially my ministry classes. I do not think APU should make admissions requirements harder, because I believe we are already academically prestigious and represent a student body that is both diverse and accepting, regardless of how students did in their academics previously.

Most of my professors never even bother to learn my name, let alone develop a relationship with me.

My classes are definitely more about learning than the grade. (I am more of a C student) But I've learned so much. However, admissions should be harder. Majority of people attending APU received a way lower SAT score than I did and were admitted.

Nursing is very challenging but general studies have been relatively easy so far

Office hours is a great way to get to know the course content better and to be connected with professors

Only requirements were 1bible 1ministry class. maybe you should make it harder, since you pride in constantly threatening science majors to change major.

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Part of the beauty of APU is that it accepts people from all walks of life and if the school was more academically prestigious, that would only mean turning people away that could really benefit from the tangible presence of God on this campus. Schools that try too hard for academic prestige end up too focused on that and forgetting about their Christian purpose, like the Ivy Leagues have done.

Pick smart people.

Seems like the academic admissions requirements are fine.

Simply my opinions.

Some are difficult, but others are incredibly easy.

Some general ed courses can be very difficult and overwhelming with the amount of work that sometimes I can't focus on the work for my actual major because I'm too worried about my general eds.

Some of the general studies feel like High School classes.

Some professors are approachable and some are not.

The classes are great. They all require hard work but it is not too bad.

The classes for my major really challenge me to get out of my comfort zone and be creative and write new things and do unique projects.

The classes outside of my major were generally good but I learned nothing in my major classes.

The current admissions requirements are attainable; however the college is prestigious also. Depending on the major, academics are challenging.

The faculty is arguably the finest collection of Christian men and women who love to teach and serve people. I have never felt so encouraged in my academics quite like at apu.

THE LAST ONE IS ONE THAT SHOULD NOT BE OVERLOOKED. I will be brief, and my next statement, is one that is just part of a view I hold. If we are truly a "God first" school, we should not be focused on making APU "more prestigious" but instead as a school that seeks to empower anybody who wants to attend, with the education of understanding their vocation in life. I would even go as far as arguing that APU should be a school not worried about prestige, but instead of a school that offers education to the marginalized, instead of the ones who can afford to just get in.

The professors are the best part of APU, but often times general studies classes require far too much of a challenge. APU admits many people I do not believe should be in higher education.

The professors are wonderful. I have never been dissatisfied with any professor in any department. The classes I have are at the perfect level of challenge. However, it seems as if APU accepts too many undergrads. The living spaces are beginning to overflow and every class is waitlisted.

The professors that I have encountered care about their students and their success. They strongly encourage students to contact them whenever the students have questions.

The professors vary, but they have always been nice and showed that they care for the students. Others have made a point to try and connect with me more than others. Overall it has been a great experience. I think the thing that needs to be worked on is for some professors to understand that general

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introduction classes are just as they state. They are for an introduction. Instances I have heard are about introduction classes feel like they are harder than they need to be. For my major, I am having a blast learning and being challenged as I go along in the theater classes. The professors are great and I learn and grow each semester.

There are some students here that make college seem less prestigious.

There is extreme diversity in the caliber of scholar here at APU, and it can be frustrating for those on the high end of the spectrum.

There were many things I learned from GEs because I was not well rounded coming in but there were aspects that simply were not challenging at times.

The school is overcrowded and admitting more and more freshman is too much for the school and STUDENTS to handle.

The school is starting to become overpopulated. There isn't enough parking, sometimes the classes are full, and commuters don't get any perks.

They should have auditions for everyone in music, before allowing students to take it for their major and offer the student a minor or emphasis in music while studying another major on campus if they feel the student is unsuitable for it.

Though I have to work to do well in classes, nothing has been super challenging over my time. There is also an atmosphere around that people don't care about their classes or try very hard or do the work. This harms having any really stimulating conversations in class.

Too many people attending

With the university beginning to struggle in accommodating the growing size of the student body, it only seems logical to increase admittance requirements and to strive for academic excellence.

Yes for the most part

You don't necessarily need to make admissions harder, but you do need to change the communal focus. Things sometimes feel very anti-intellectual here. Talk to the High Sierra program about how they promote the right focus.
