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STUDENT GOVERNMENT ELECTION

Through classroom presentations, social media campaigns and elections information sessions, the ASI student government elections voter turnout increased from 6.8% to 7.8%.

\$39,250 was awarded in scholarships to 86 students for their contribution to the Sacramento State campus and community.

107 students served on internal and university-wide committees.

\$875 was allocated from the 2016/2017 strategic priority fund to provide 7 at \$125 grants to reimburse incurred campaign expenditures for students seeking election in the 2017/2018 ASI Election year.

 $\overline{55}$ clubs and organizations participated in the 2017 ASI Elections Club Ballot earning dollars for their club.

Other, Highlights

Auccess Atories

The ASI Board of Directors helped launch the Sac State Mobile application, Epicure Extras, an initiative to increase free food opportunities for student experiencing food insecurity.

The inaugural Sac State Pride and University President's Day was established on April 5, 2018.

The Board partnered with campus entities and student organizations in order to host a campus-wide professional clothing drive April 23-27, 2018. The clothes were collected, then distributed at the Annual Career Fair held April 27, 2018.



The Aquatic Center is located off Highway 50 and Hazel Avenue on beautiful Lake Natoma in Gold River, CA. The Aquatic Center is a nationally recognized rowing facility holding many collegiate, open, high school and masters rowing competitions. This ASI facility is a regional boating instruction safety center as part of a program funded by the California Department of Boating and Waterways. The Aquatic Center offers programs through education, recreation, and competition in the following areas: sailing, windsurfing, canoeing, kayaking, stand up paddling, rowing, water skiing, wakeboarding, and jet skiing. All of the programming offered is available to the general public; with the special benefit of Sac State students receiving discounted pricing.



Success Stories

64,000⁺ people visited and used the Aquatic Center during the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Approximately 100 Sacramento State students received course credit for completing kinesiology classes at the Aquatic Center.

7,500⁺ Sacramento State students/faculty rented equipment at the Aquatic Center; including Kayaks, Stand-Up Paddle Boards, Sailboats, Hydro Bikes, Canoes, and Paddleboats.

250 first-year students participated in the new student orientation night, with team builds, races and relays, and water enrichment training.



The Sacramento State Aquatic Center remains the largest Boating Instructional Safety Center in Northern California, educating aquatic enthusiasts on how to wear life jackets and to be safe in and on the water.





The Children's Center serves as a family support service for Sacramento State students by providing child care programming. Enrollment priority is given to Sac State students, and then opened to the rest of the Sac State community. Accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, the Children's Center is an exemplary program which models current principles and practice in child development. The Children's Center serves as a home-oriented environment to meet a child's emotional, physical, intellectual and social growth needs. The Children's Center promotes educational experiences in the area of early childhood education by employing a large number of Sacramento State students.





Auccess Atories

\$57,568 was awarded in a block grant to the Children's Center for achieving the highest quality ranking of Tier 5 from Sacramento County.

The Children's Center provided award-winning child care services to an average of 233 children throughout the fall and spring semesters.

100 Sac State students were subsidized fees to help cover the cost of child care.

The Children's Center employed 105 Sac State Students throughout the fall and spring semesters providing hands-on training in the child development field.

The Children's Center provided 1,200 hours of observation for Sac State students and placed 60 fieldwork students into the classrooms for the fall and spring semesters.

The Children's Center hosted multiple events such as the annual "More than Scribbles" Art Gala, Day on the Quad, a Holiday party for Mr. and Mrs. Nelson, and a Parent Perspective Panel discussion for student assistants.



Peak Adventures is an outdoor adventure provider for Northern California, dedicated to providing adventure education and leadership development opportunities for all ages. Since 1989, Peak Adventures has been an affordable outdoor recreation provider within the Sacramento Valley. Program offerings include backpacking, day hiking, camping, mountain biking, rock climbing, white water rafting and more! Staff teaches snowshoeing, snowboarding, mountaineering techniques, cross-country skiing and downhill skiing.

The Peak Adventures Challenge Center empowers individuals and teams to achieve greater results through a personalized learning experience they won't forget! Skilled facilitators engage participants in interactive games that build relationship, challenging problem-solving activities to strengthen teamwork, and exciting climbing opportunities to inspire personal growth.





Success Stories

Over **2**,**000** people registered for Sac State's team during the fall 2017 Outdoor Nation Campus Challenge. Peak Adventures led in the effort the way to get the most people to go outside and be active.

Sac State logged 8,204 outdoor activities during this 4-week competition. Sac State took 1st place in the Western Region and placed 3rd nationwide

1,000⁺ freshmen participated in FYE (First Year Experience) and Frosh Night programs at the Peak Adventures Challenge Center. Through their participation at the Challenge Center, freshman bond with their classmates, learn about themselves, and ultimately feel more at home during their first year at Sac State. These bonding experiences increase the chances for student success and retention

\$800 was allocated to establish a new Peak Adventures Outdoor Trip Scholarship, a 75% subsidy on any Peak Adventures outdoor trip.

I began working for Peak Adventures in March 2016. Since that time, I have experienced a tremendous amount of growth in my personal and academic life. Our #1 rule at Peak Adventures is Take Care of Yourself. Learning to take care of myself holistically has been, and will continue to be a journey. As a Type 1 Diabetic, I used to look at my disability as a burden. Peak Adventures has empowered me to look at my disability from a new perspective; I am a strong individual that has the ability to overcome challenges and choose how I want to live. Peak Adventures has an inviting culture that encourages all to reach their fullest potential and that is a quality that I cherish. I have also learned: to become fully engaged in anything I do, to become an advocate for diversity and speak up for the underrepresented populations in recreation like members of the LGBTQ community and people of color, and to get connected on campus. In my earlier days at Sacramento State I was like most students and could not wait to leave campus after class. Now I am so much more aware of all the different entities on campus that exist to support me in my journey to graduation and success as I define it, beyond Sacramento State.

ASI Student Engagement & Outreach

Student Engagement & Outreach (SEO) enhances the collegiate experience of Sac State students by increasing awareness of ASI resources and providing students with meaningful engagement and leadership opportunities. SEO's outreach and programs KSSU Student Run Radio Station, the Food Pantry, Safe Rides, and the A-Team offer opportunities that will assist students with personal growth, developing civic responsibility, embracing differences, and establishing connections within the campus and surrounding community.

Success Stories

4600⁺ transactions took place at the ASI Food Pantry, providing non-perishable food items to Sac State students in need.

11 Feel Good Friday events took place, where students had the opportunity to de-stress while doing hands on art projects and activities.

4000⁺ students took the Student Voice Survey to better understand their perception and views of ASI programs and services.

8000⁺ students attended a total of 18 Pop Up Pantry events, where they were provided fresh produce at no-cost.

I always thought nutrition and food were the main components but as I began to work as a Food Pantry Coordinator my thoughts changed for the better. Many fellow Hornets face food insecurity which is also something that we are continuing to learn about as a Dietetics major. Being able to provide students with a sense of relief by having a Food Pantry is something that I think will help me be a great Registered Dietitian Nutritionist one day. Since Sac State is such a diverse campus I get to meet students from all different cultural backgrounds which helps me becoming culturally sensitive (something all Dietitians work towards). Everyone has a unique story and I am lucky to be able to hear them all.

The Office of Business and Administration serves as the corporate accounting, payroll, human resource and information technology departments for ASI. We service 55 full-time staff, 200 part-time staff, six internal departments, over 200 clubs and organizations, the Union WELL Inc., and the State Hornet. The business and administration office provide numerous services to the campus community which includes financial services for clubs and organizations, retail sales of graduation caps and gowns, laptops for check-out, theater tickets, money orders, faxing services, stamps for sale, student health insurance and legal aid with an attorney.



Success Stories

6,800⁺ caps and gowns were sold by the Student Shop for 2017-18 Sac State graduation ceremonies.

4,200⁺ accounts payable checks were processed with a large portion processed for campus clubs & organizations.

2,300⁺ payroll checks and **5,100**⁺ direct deposits were processed for student and staff employees through the Business Office payroll department.



Provided two DOC (Dollars for Organizations & Clubs) presentations in the University Union's Hinde auditorium in an effort to give more information to clubs on how to apply and get reimbursed through DOC funding. Both sessions were well attended and all seats were filled.


