Associated Students, Inc. (ASI) enjoyed another very productive year during 2016–2017. Our hard-working and passionate board members, staff and volunteers devoted themselves to fulfilling ASI's mission to provide a breadth of diverse programs and services to Sacramento State students, staff, faculty, and members of the greater Sacramento community. The impact of our efforts is summed up in some very impressive numbers that help illustrate how many individuals and entities benefited from ASI over the course of this past year. These numbers communicate totals and collectives, which in many instances are notable. Would you have guessed that 2,200 safe and confidential rides were provided to Sac State students in an effort to ensure their safety? Or, that over 1,000 students tapped our Food Pantry to supplement their food resources? How about over 51,000 visits to the Aquatic Center for instruction, recreation and competition in water activities on Lake Natoma? These are but a few of the numbers that are contained in this year's Annual Report and help to tell the story of how we continued to fulfill our mission to support experiential education, opportunities for leadership development, recreational programs and contributions to the life of our campus.

Quantifying the number of participants, amount of allocated funding, or delivery of events and activities tells only a portion of the ASI story. It is the individuals who directly benefit, each in their own unique way, from their engagement as a program participant, a student employee, or a recipient of a financial support or service that hold the deeper, more meaningful story of ASI's impact. I readily recollect the delight and relief on students' faces as they received their ASI scholarship awards, stating how the financial support was critical to covering their school and living expenses. I heard the gratitude expressed by student parents who stated they could not have imagined successfully completing their degree without the convenient, quality, subsidized child care provided by our Children's Center. There were countless students, like Doug Lyle in Peak Adventures, who have shared how their work experience increased their understanding of their academic courses and helped prepare them for successful employment in their chosen professions. There also continued to be a number of our students who committed themselves to leadership roles in representing and advocating for their fellow students through participation on the ASI Board of Directors. Each of them, in their own way, emerged at the end of the year with deeper understanding of their own strengths and greater empathy for the challenges and successes of their fellow students. As part of the Board of Directors strategic priorities, the BOD visited 60 clubs in 60 days.

The DOC Committee received 467 applications for DOC funding, and awarded 135 clubs and organizations in excess of \$163,100 in funds for their events, activities, conferences and leadership training.

32 applications for the National Travel Fund received awards in the total amount of \$12,500 for the 2016-2017 year and \$5,000 was awarded to 8 clubs that qualified and applied for the National Championship fund.

\$31,500 was awarded in scholarships to 56 students for their contributions to the Sacramento State campus and community.

55 clubs and organizations participated in the 2017 ASI Elections Club Ballot earning dollars for their club.

Other Highlights

The ASI Board established the Housing & Food Insecurities Task Force.

The ASI Green Team established a Student Garden in partnership with campus Sustainability and a grant from CSSA.

The Sacramento State Men's Rowing Club, which received DOC funding over the course of the 2016-17 academic year, found out just before finals week that they had qualified for a Championship competition in Georgia. ASI was able to assist the club the day after they qualified by ensuring they met the requirements to apply for ASI's National Travel and National Championship Fund to travel to the competition. ASI processed and reviewed their application in less than 24 hours so that the Rowing Club could purchase their plane tickets for the competition. The team performed well in competition and were so pleased that ASI could support their efforts.

ASI Aquatic Center

The Aquatic Center is located off Highway 50 and Hazel Avenue on beautiful Lake Natoma in Gold River, CA. The Aquatic Center is a nationally recognized rowing facility holding many collegiate, open, high school and masters rowing competitions. This ASI facility is a regional boating instruction safety center as part of a program funded by the California Department of Boating and Waterways. The Aquatic Center offers programs through education, recreation, and competition in the following areas: sailing, windsurfing, canoeing, kayaking, stand up paddling, rowing, water skiing, wakeboarding, and jet skiing. All of the programming offered is available to the general public; with the special benefit of Sac State students receiving discounted pricing.



6,950 Sacramento State students rented equipment at the Aquatic Center. This included rentals of the following: Kayaks, Stand-Up Paddle Boards, Sailboats, Hydro Bikes, Canoes, and Paddleboats.

1,864 Sacramento State students, faculty and staff members participated in Aquatic Center programming.

2,278 Youth attended the Aquatic Center Summer Camp, $3,500^+$ youth in various school groups, and approximately 1,000 at risk youth learned how to be safer in and around the water and learned aquatic activities.

51,400 people visited and used the Aquatic Center and its Aquatic programs.



The Aquatic Center is one of the few campus recreational facilities that offers academic classes for college credit through the Kinesiology department. In the Fall of 2016 the Aquatic Center had 68 Sac State Students who enrolled in one of our course offerings (Sailing, Windsurfing, Rowing, or Water Skiing).



ASI Children's Center

The Children's Center serves as a family support service for Sacramento State students by providing child care programming. Enrollment priority is given to Sac State students, and then opened to the rest of the Sac State community. Accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, the Children's Center is an exemplary program which models current principles and practice in child development. The Children's Center serves as a home-oriented environment to meet a child's emotional, physical, intellectual and social growth needs. The Children's Center promotes educational experiences in the area of early childhood education by employing a large number of Sacramento State students.





The Children's Center quality rating score from Sacramento County's Office of Education Raising Quality Together rose to the top—to Tier 5.

\$35,083 was awarded in a block grant to the Children's Center to maintain quality standards, in response to the new Tier 5 ranking.

95 Sacramento State students were provided mentorship and guidance in support of their child development courses that required direct experience.

 300^+ guests attended the Children's Center "More than Scribbles" Evening Gala in the Art Gallery in the Student Union.

In 2016-17, ASI's Children Center increased their Sacramento County Office of Education Raising Quality Together Quality Ranking to the top, earning the Center over \$35,000 in block grants. The Children's Center used a portion of that funding to support its staff and to highlight their work as professionals by purchasing equipment that included A/V projectors for the common area, laptops, and ASI business cards. The teaching tools were presented to the staff as a surprise during a workshop about professionalism to much delight and appreciation.

ASI Peak Adventures

Peak Adventures is an outdoor adventure provider for Northern California, dedicated to providing adventure education and leadership development opportunities for all ages. Since 1989, Peak Adventures has been an affordable outdoor recreation provider within the Sacramento Valley. Program offerings include backpacking, day hiking, camping, mountain biking, rock climbing, white water rafting and more! Staff teaches snowshoeing, snowboarding, mountaineering techniques, cross-country skiing and downhill skiing.

The Peak Adventures Challenge Center empowers individuals and teams to achieve greater results through a personalized learning experience they won't forget! Skilled facilitators engage participants in interactive games that build relationships, facilitate challenging problem-solving activities to strengthen teamwork, and exciting climbing opportunities to inspire personal growth.





4,000 pounds of trash was removed from the American River Parkway Trail by 61 student volunteers during Sac State's 2017 Alternate Spring Break, through a Peak Adventures partnership with the campus' Community Engagement Center.

30 part-time employees participated in nearly 900 hours of technical and facilitation training at the ASI Peak Adventures Challenge Center, helping the employees further develop their leadership skills in experiential education.

2,000⁺ outdoor equipment items were rented from Peak Adventures, helping students get outside to go backpacking, mountain biking, rock climbing, camping, rafting, snowboarding and snowshoeing.

Other Highlights

Peak Adventure's spring break trip to the Grand Canyon was so popular that it was necessary to double the size of the trip.

In celebration of Earth Day, Peak Adventures partnered with the University Union to host a movie screening, Love Thy Nature.

My time with Peak Adventures will always hold a special place in my heart.

On the challenge course is where I discovered my outside voice, honed my eye and attention to detail, nurtured my confidence, released my fun-loving childish side, and did so much growing and self-development... When I started utilizing the skills I learned at the challenge course outside of the course ... it really struck me just how invaluable the group facilitation skills and knowledge of experiential education imparted on me truly was. Even after my relatively short stay with Peak Adventures I now see the world around me in an entirely new light, through the eyes of a group facilitator.

ASI Student Engagement & Putreach

The mission of Associated Students' Student Engagement & Outreach (SEO) department is to enhance the collegiate experience of Sac State students by increasing their awareness of ASI resources and provide them with meaningful engagement and leadership opportunities. SEO's outreach and programs, KSSU Student Run Radio Station, the Food Pantry, Safe Rides, and the A-Team offer opportunities that assist students with personal growth, developing civic responsibility, embracing differences, and establishing connections within the campus and surrounding community.

1000⁺ students were served at the Food Pantry, which aims to decrease the impact that food insecurity has on the academic success of Sac State students.

13 Pop Up Pantry events allowed ASI to partner with the Central Downtown Food Basket to distribute fresh produce at no cost to Sac State students in need.

37% increase was seen in ASI Instagram followers, through engaging contests like the "ASI Amazing Race" and the "30 in 30 Challenge."

2,205 students were picked up by Safe Rides, which is designed to prevent incidents related to drinking and driving, with a total of 13,249 miles driven.

Other Highlights

Worked with Downtown Ford Sales to obtain a vehicle for the Food Pantry to use.

In the academic year 2016-17, SEO assisted in the project oversight of developing a website for students looking for off-campus roommates now launched and called "Herky's Roommate Finder."

SEO worked with Sacramento State Engineering and Computer Science majors to develop a web-based mobile app for Safe Rides to help students request a ride home during operational hours. The app is projected to go live in 2017-18.




As a dietetics major, the topic of food insecurity is discussed quite extensively. While these discussions have been thought provoking and insightful, meeting the students and seeing the faces of those who experience it firsthand has changed my perspective greatly. Food insecurity is not black and white, it's not circle or square, but rather a spectrum of names, faces, and stories. I've met students who have experienced everything from not being able to make ends meet for the week to those who are homeless or getting out of physically-abusive relationships. It's difficult to quantify the impact the Food Pantry is making on this campus, but if you can imagine the sigh of relief as a student selects and fills a bag with food and necessities, or hear the sincerity in their voice as they thank me before they leave, that lets me know how much this program means to Sacramento State students.

ASI Business & Administration

The ASI office of Business and Administration serves as the corporate accounting, payroll, human resource and information technology departments for ASI. The Business and Administration Office services 55 full-time staff, 200 part-time staff, six internal departments, over 200 clubs and organizations, the Union WELL Inc., and the State Hornet. The Business and Administration office provides numerous services to the campus community which includes financial services for clubs and organizations, retail sales of graduation caps and gowns, laptops for check-out, theater tickets, money orders, faxing services, stamps for sale, and no cost legal assistance and consultations with an attorney.



 $6,000^+$ cap and gowns were sold by the Student Shop for 2016-17 Sac State graduation ceremonies.

5,300 accounts payable checks were processed, with a large portion processed for campus clubs & organizations.


 $3,100^{+}$ payroll checks and over 4,700 direct deposits were processed for student and staff employees through the Business Office payroll department.


