



Former Grafton Job Corps graduate, Isaac Afriryie, completed 19 weeks of Basic Training at Fort Leonard Wood Military Base in Missouri on July 20th as a Private 31B Military Police. He was sworn in for five years and will spend the next two years at Fort Stuart in Georgia. He explained that he relied on the comradery of his "battle buddies" to succeed through Basic Training. He relied on one in particular because "it's not something you can do alone."

Isaac enrolled at Job Corps on May 24, 2016 and was enrolled in HiSET courses as well as the Culinary Arts program and completed all within that year. He speaks highly of the Job Corps program and says that the program is not one that should be taken for granted because "anything is possible." Grafton Job Corps was the only non-collegiate SGA present which only encouraged Briana more, "In the words of Oprah, 'Surround yourself with only people who are going to lift you higher."



In addition to networking opportunities, multiple classes and a variety of topics were offered. Two in particular stood out. "13 Steps to a Super Government" with Butch Oxedine presented great ideas to increase interest and participation from the student body. "Leadership Reloaded: Skills for Effective SG Members" with Christopher Irving explained skills that have a lasting impact. Both Mr. Oxedine and Mr. Irving accepted invitations to come and speak at our Center in the future.

Briana also found personal and leadership growth from another class offering titled, "Change Agents; Diversity Training for SG Leaders". "(The participants) were "raw and honest and it not only taught me that everyone has a bias, including myself but it also taught me that not all biases are purposeful," she reflected. "I walked out of that session realizing that the excuses "That's the way it's always been" and "That's how we've always done it" are dangerous and need to be challenged more effectively. It was definitely an eye-opener and I'm glad that I went, because I left with a better understanding of the world from other points of view."
