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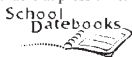

Bakersfield College Student Government Association (BCSGA) is your student government at Bakersfield College that voices your concerns. BCSGA presents your opinions, needs, and concerns to such groups as the College Council, the State Student California Community College (SSCCC), and many campus-wide and district-wide committees. BCSGA also allocates your Campus Center and Student Representation fees to programs and services that directly benefit students and the Campus Center.

The Association is composed of 12 senators and 12 officers. BCSGA is to be the official voice for the students at Bakersfield College and to ensure that the students are represented in all matters of the participatory governance. Through lobbying, advocacy, and student representation, the Association ensures a supportive educational environment while promoting unity and cooperation with students, faculty, staff, and administration. It is the intent of the Association to promote campus life, student involvement, and engagement.

To be eligible to run for a BCSGA Office, Bakersfield College students must be enrolled in and successfully complete at least six semester hours at Bakersfield College and maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA. While each Bakersfield College student cannot serve as an elected member of Student Government, many opportunities exist for participation in various task forces and committees. The Renegade Pantry began in 2009, when there was a massive cut to California Community College special needs programs, which led to a growing need among students. BCSGA responded to the needs of their constituents and developed the Renegade Pantry program. The Pantry's main goal is to help maintain the health and welfare of Bakersfield College students through organized college, community sponsorships, and donations of nonperishable food items.

How can I contribute to the Renegade Pantry?

The Renegade Pantry gladly accepts any non-perishable/perishable food, hygiene items, clothing, blankets, monetary, toys, pet food, school/office supplies, and/or similar donations. The Pantry accepts monetary donations which you can take to the Business Office. You can also help by volunteering at The Pantry during distribution week; sign-ups are in Office of Student Life.

How can I take advantage of this service?

You can sign up for a food order the week of distributions; all sign ups must be completed before the actual day of distribution in the Office of Student Life. Distributions will always be on Thursday; unless, otherwise noted because of holidays. Delano Campus students sign-up at Admissions and Records on the designated dates.

## CAMPUS CENTER

The Campus Center was opened on June 15, 1956. The building was renamed the John Collins Campus Center on September 10, 2003 in honor of Dr. John J. Collins, former Bakersfield College President from 1972 to 1983.

The Campus Center offers a wide range of services and programs and is a place of relaxation and recreation for students. It is your "home away from home," the community center of the college. The Campus Center is located in the middle of campus, and many Campus Center programs and events are funded by campus center activity fees.

The Campus Center courtyard is a great outdoor gathering spot on campus. It features picnic tables, WiFi access, and shade umbrellas. During the year, many campus activities are held in this area for Club Week, Spring Fling, Homecoming Week, and more.

## STUDENT ID ONECARD

Every Bakersfield College student needs a Student Identification Card. A properly validated Student ID enables you to use the Library, the computer lab, and other services. The OneCard combines your student ID with a prepaid Debit MasterCard. It is designed as a smart solution to managing college experiences and it will speed up the financial aid refund process. Because it is not a credit card, there is no risk of running up debit for you can only spend what you have in your account. Students will be receiving their cards in the mail. Once you have received your card, you can choose to register it online through a secure link from Bakersfield College's website. During registration, you can select the Basic or Deluxe Account. The Basic Account allows you to get your financial aid refunds added directly to your account. If you choose to register for a Deluxe Account, you will get additional ways to add money to your account including but not limited to inviting parents and direct deposit of payroll funds. Please note that your Social Security number is required when you register online for the Deluxe Account. We hope that the OneCard streamlines money management and enhances your experience at Bakersfield College.

Bakersfield College and Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSPS) are dedicated to providing quality services to meet the needs of students with disabilities. Students are the center of what we do, and we put students first, above all else. We strive to ensure access to all aspects of the college. Services are available to any student who finds his or her disability to be a barrier to achieving educational goals.

However, only those students who identify themselves to the college and present appropriate written documentation of a disability are eligible for accommodation. Students with disabilities should contact the DSPS office as soon as possible, even if they are not yet enrolled.

To be eligible to receive services students must provide disability verification and meet with the DSPS Counselor for intake. Services may include:

- Test proctoring in quiet rooms with extended time
- Alternate format services (e-text, large print, Braille)
- Computer lab with assistive software (speech-to-text, text-to-speech, magnification, etc.)
- Specialized classes
- Adaptive Fitness
- Assistive Technology
- Career/Job Placement Assistance
- Scribes who write for you
- Notetakers or taped lectures
- Computer Aided Realtime Translation
- Sign Language Interpreters
- Bookstore Front of Line privileges
- Mobility Cart

The Student Success Lab offers free, individualized math, reading, and English guided tutorials. Students can expect to get individually prescribed lessons in reading, writing, math, and study skills through new computer technology, upgraded PLATO software and a friendly atmosphere. The lab is open Monday and Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday and Wednesday from 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. Academic Development faculty and teaching assistants help students in the following credit and non-credit courses:

- ACDV B201 abc (0.5/1 unit or non-credit): Individualized/diagnostic math, reading and English learning modules. Individually prescribed lessons in spelling, reading, vocabulary development, study skills, critical thinking and/or English.
- ACDV B281 abc (non-credit): Computer-assisted tutoring courses. Provides tutoring in various academic subjects, conducted in a computer lab, to augment classroom instruction. Open entry/open exit.

The Child Development Center at Bakersfield College (CDC) offers a student service with the primary goal of providing a comprehensive child development program that serves student families and their children. Our role is to provide the time and support to assist student families in achieving their chosen academic/career goals. The CDC demonstration laboratory classrooms offer a model of best practices in early childhood education while providing students learning opportunities through observation and on-floor interactions with young children and their families.

The centers are licensed through the California Department of Social Services. All teachers are professionally trained in the field of early childhood education, and are certificated through the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing. Placement in the program is made according to state priorities and date of application. The program is designed for income eligible families who are enrolled in college courses leading to a specific career/professional goal.

Students seeking financial assistance to meet the costs of education are encouraged to contact the Office of Financial Aid, located on the second floor of the Students Services building and at the Delano Campus.

A variety of grants, scholarships, loans and part-time employment opportunities available for students who qualify on the basis of financial need, enrollment in six or more units leading to a degree or certificate, and satisfactory academic progress.

### 2015-16 Financial Aid Status

Want to know your status? Check InsideBC for your 2015-16 Financial Aid status and to verify if there is any additional paperwork that you will need to submit for the coming year. If it does not give you an option to check your 2015-16 status, please verify that your 2015-16 FAFSA was processed through [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). Remember: It is your responsibility to be sure you have submitted all required documentation in a timely manner! Check your emails and InsideBC account at least once a week. If you have documents outstanding in Financial Aid then they will be listed in your InsideBC account.

All students are required to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov) to be considered for any of the following programs:

### Board of Governor's Fee Waiver (BOGW)

Did you update your Board of Governor's Fee Waiver (BOGFW)? Check your InsideBC Student Account Summary to verify if the Board of Governor's Fee Waiver has been processed. Please allow 24 hours from the time that classes are officially added for the fee waiver to process.

### California Dream Act

The California Dream Act of 2011 became law through the passage of two state bills. AB 130 relating to private scholarships and AB 131 relating to Financial Aid Administered by the State of California.

The California Dream Act allows students who meet certain criteria (as defined by AB 540) to apply for and, if eligible, receive:

- Privately-funded scholarships
- Board of Governors Fee Waivers
- Assistance from EOP&S, CARE or CalWORKs
- State financial aid like Cal Grants and Chaffee Grants

### ***Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOP&S)***

The EOP&S Program is a state funded program that serves students from low-income and educationally disadvantaged backgrounds. Services include academic, career and personal counseling, peer mentoring, financial aid advising, scholarship information, transfer assistance, books and other support services. The EOP&S Program's primary goal is to encourage the enrollment, retention and transfer of students with educational disadvantages to facilitate the successful completion of their goals and objectives in college. Students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine eligibility.

### ***Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE)***

State funded program offering supportive services financial assistance for low-income, single parent EOP&S students.

### ***Federal Pell Grant***

Federal grant program based upon need, cost of attendance and level of enrollment.

### ***Federal Stafford Students Loans***

State insured loans available from certain banks and lending institutions on long-term repayment plans.

### ***Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant***

Federal program which provides additional grant assistance for students with exceptional financial need.

### ***Federal Work Study (FWS)***

On-campus employment is available through Federal Work-Study, a federally funded program for students who can demonstrate financial need and enrollment in six or more units. Employment is used to fund college expenses.

### ***Plus Loans***

Loans for parents with good credit histories.

### ***Scholarships***

More than 600 scholarships are awarded each year to students who file Scholarship Applications with the Office of Financial Aid. The Bakersfield College Foundation, as well as community organizations and individuals, offer scholarships based upon financial need and academic merit. The scholarship application process is now online. The application process opens in October. Check the Financial Aid website for additional information.

Some Bakersfield College scholarships have certain requirements including major, class level, or even graduation from a particular high school. Scholarships are awarded to incoming, continuing and transferring students. Generally a student must have at least a 2.50 GPA, although some scholarships are awarded to students with a lower average who meet special criteria or need or possess special qualifications. Scholarships are awarded only once each academic year.

### ***Outside Scholarships***

There are many outside scholarships available to qualified students. Business firms, organizations and four-year colleges provide scholarships for students. Notices regarding scholarship opportunities are posted throughout the year on bulletin boards in the Office of Financial Aid.

### ***Financial Aid Disbursements***

There will be three financial aid disbursements for 2015-2016. The disbursement percentages and dates are below:

- Fall 2015
  - o First Disbursement: 30% of the Financial Aid Award: August 21, 2015
  - o Second Disbursement: 20% of the Financial Aid Award: September 18, 2015
  - o Third Disbursement: 50% of the Financial Aid Award: November 8, 2015
- Spring 2016
  - o First Disbursement: 30% of the Financial Aid Award: January 15, 2016
  - o Second Disbursement: 20% of the Financial Aid Award: February 12, 2016
  - o Third Disbursement: 50% of the Financial Aid Award: April 8, 2016

Bakersfield College recognizes that technology is a vehicle to access the most current and extensive sources of information throughout the campus. The use of technology prepares students for 21st Century careers. Bakersfield College provides technology for a limited educational purpose. This means students may use these resources for classroom activities and other school related work. Students may not use District technology for commercial purposes; students may not offer, provide, or purchase products or services using District technology. Students may use District technology only for class assignments or for personal research on subjects similar to what they might study in a class or in the school library. Use for entertainment purposes or personal communication, such as personal blogging, instant messaging, online shopping, or gaming is not allowed.

The District may place reasonable restrictions on the material that students access through the system, and may revoke students' access to District technology if they violate the law, District policies or regulations. Violations of the law or this policy may be reported to the Office of Student Life. In addition, violations of the law or this policy may result in disciplinary actions.

Use of the instructional computers by students at Bakersfield College is encouraged. Access to academic computing services is a privilege enjoyed by all students. The Computer Commons, located in the library, is an open lab. Computers are also available in Student Services Academic Use Area adjacent to EOPS. Student workers are available to assist students in the use of these computers. Unauthorized access or use of academic computing facilities is in violation of Section 502.b-c of the California Penal Code. Offenders will be disciplined and/or prosecuted in accordance with existing college policy and California Law.

## SMOKE-FREE CAMPUS

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has found secondhand tobacco smoke to be a risk to public health, and has classified secondhand smoke as a group 'A' carcinogen, the most dangerous class of carcinogen. Furthermore, the California Air Resources Board has categorized secondhand smoke as a toxic air contaminant. Tobacco smoke and tobacco products are hazardous to smokers and non-smokers alike. To promote a safe and healthy campus environment, Bakersfield College has adopted this smoke-free policy.

Smoking and tobacco usage is prohibited on all property and in all indoor and outdoor spaces owned, leased, licensed, or otherwise controlled by Bakersfield College. Smoking and tobacco usage is prohibited in all vehicles owned by Bakersfield College and at any event or activity on campus property.

For individuals interested in quitting smoking or smokeless tobacco use, the Student Health and Wellness Center will provide free cessation services. ## REGISTERING FOR CLASSES

### ***Course Admission Policy***

The policy of the College is that, unless specifically exempted by statute or regulation, every course, course section, or class reported for state aid, wherever offered and maintained by the college, shall be fully open to enrollment and participating by any person who has been admitted to the college and, when applicable, a relevant program, and who meets established prerequisites.

### ***Prerequisites***

Many Bakersfield College courses have basic skills or course prerequisites. These prerequisites are established to assist students in selecting courses for which they have the entry level skills. Students who believe that they have the entry level skills without the appropriate assessment test scores or previous courses may challenge the prerequisite. Students have the right:

1. Appeal a prerequisite course requirement because the required course is not available.
2. Challenge any prerequisite believed to be discriminatory.
3. Challenge any matriculation regulations/procedures that have the effect of being discriminatory based on how the services are applied to you.
4. Provided alternative services for the matriculation process if necessary for ethnic and language minority students and students with disabilities.

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### **Early Registration Appointments**

Continuing students who were registered on Monday of the third week of classes are assigned early registration appointments for the following semester in the following order:

- Students who belong to specific group of special programs and who have completed matriculation.
- Students who have completed orientation, assessment, and counseling and have a student educational plan on file in descending order of the number of units completed, except that students have completed 45 to 68 will be first.

### **Registering by Web**

All early and open registration takes place in Bakersfield College's web registration system. Detailed instructions for the use of this system can be found on the Bakersfield College website at [www.bakersfieldcollege.edu](http://www.bakersfieldcollege.edu) under class schedule.

Students must be officially registered or on the official waitlist before attending classes. Registration dates are indicated in the "About the College" section of the catalog and on the website.

### **Waitlist**

The electronic waitlist feature replaces instructor-signed add slips and allows students from an established waitlist to be moved into a class when seats are available. It is a true first-come, first-serve system. Students trying to register for classes that are closed will be able to select waitlist. During the weeks prior to the start of classes, when vacancies occur in classes, first student(s) on the waitlist will be moved into the class. Students who are on a waitlist should check their registration regularly on the web. They will have ten (10) days to pay for the class once they have moved into registered students. Students will be charged the enrollment fees for waitlist classes until they are actually enrolled in the class.

Students should use the waitlist to ensure themselves a chance of getting into the classes they want.

Students on waitlist still must attend the first meeting of the class or they may be dropped for the waitlist. The prerequisites, basic skills, time conflict and repeat checks will prevent ineligible students from moving into the classes. Students may drop themselves from the waitlist at any time. If a new section of a class is opened at the same day and time as a section with a waitlist, students on the waitlist will be automatically enrolled into the new section.

The writing of an English essay may be required for placement in an English composition course (ENGL B1a, ENGL B50, ENGL B60, ACDV B68) or English for Multilingual Students (EMLS). Academic skills assessment may be waived by providing proof of eligibility for admission to a California State University with the appropriate combination of ACT and SAT scores and high school grade point average.

Bakersfield College has the responsibility to ensure that grades assigned are indicative of the knowledge and skill level of each student. Acts of academic dishonesty make it impossible to fulfill this responsibility, and they weaken our society. Faculty, students, administrators, and classified staff share responsibility for ensuring academic honesty in our college community and will make a concerted effort to fulfill the following responsibilities.

Any test, paper, or assignment submitted and that bears Bakersfield College students' name is presumed to be the own original work that has not previously been submitted for credit in another course unless you obtain prior written approval to do so from the instructor.

In all of the assignments, including homework or drafts of papers, students may use words or ideas written by other individuals in publications, web sites, or other sources, but only with proper citation. As a general rule, if citing from a published source or from a web site and the quotation is short (up to a sentence or two) place it in quotation marks; if a longer passage from a publication or web site, please indent it and use single spacing. In both cases, be sure to cite the original source in a footnote or in parentheses. If a student is not clear about the expectations for completing an assignment or taking a test or examination, be sure to seek clarification from the instructor beforehand.

Finally, students should keep in mind that as a member of the Bakersfield College campus academic community, students are expected to demonstrate integrity in all of your academic endeavors and will be evaluated on their own merits. Students should be proud of their academic accomplishments and help to protect and promote academic integrity at Bakersfield College. The consequences of cheating and academic dishonesty – including a formal written warning, possible loss of grade – are simply not worth it.

**Student Conduct** (Revised December 13, 2001)—Since public education is furnished by the people, it is a privilege. The Board of Trustees of the Kern Community College District, in support of public education and the exercise of general supervision of the campuses, requires that student conduct must reflect the standards of appropriate behavior as defined in pursuant sections. (Education Code Section 76037)

**4F8A** Students shall respect constituted authority. This shall include conformance to Federal and State laws, Board regulations, College regulations, and applicable provisions of civil law.

**4F8B** The District expects students to conduct themselves in a manner consistent with the educational purposes of the College. Student conduct should reflect consideration for the rights of others, and students are expected to cooperate with all members of the College community. (For specific guidelines regarding conduct, see **Policy 4F8D** of this Manual.)

**4F8C** College personnel are responsible for communicating appropriate student conduct and for reporting any violations thereof, and the College President or designee shall have the right to administer suitable and proper corrective measures for misconduct.

**4F8D** The Board of Trustees, the College President or designee may suspend a student for good cause or when the presence of the student causes a continuing danger to the physical safety of the student or others. The Board of Trustees may exclude from attendance in regular classes any student whose physical or mental disability is such as to cause his or her attendance to be inimical to the welfare of other students. (Education Code Sections 76020 and 76030)

As used in this section, *good cause* includes, but is not limited to, the following offenses that may result in the imposition of sanction(s) (See **Policy 4F8E** of this Manual):

“Good cause” may be established by using appropriate investigation standards, such as:

- Interview of witnesses
- Review of Campus Security Report, if applicable
- Review of written statements, if applicable
- Review of pertinent documents, if applicable
- Review of any other evidence, if applicable

### **Student Codes of Conduct:**

1. Persistent or gross acts of willful disobedience and/or defiance toward College personnel.
2. Assault, battery, or any other form of physical abuse of a student or College employee.
3. Verbal abuse of a student or College employee. This includes, but is not limited to: defamation, obscenity, or “fighting words.” (Education Code Section 66301)
4. Any conduct that threatens the health or safety of the individual, or another, including any such action that takes place at an event sponsored or supervised by the College.
5. Theft of or damage to the property of the College, another student, or staff.
6. Interference with the normal operations of the College (e.g., disruption of teaching and administrative functions, disciplinary procedures, pedestrian or vehicular traffic, or other College activities, including its public service functions).
7. Use of personal portable sound amplification equipment and other electronic devices (radios, cell telephones, pagers, and tape players, etc.) in a manner that disturbs the privacy of other individuals and/or the instructional program of the College.

8. Unauthorized entry into, or use of, College facilities, equipment, materials, or supplies.
9. Abuse of and/or tampering with the registration process.
10. Forgery, falsification, alteration, or misuse of College documents, records, or identification.
11. Dishonesty such as cheating, plagiarizing, or knowingly furnishing false information to the College and its officials. See **Appendix 4F8D** of this Manual for Student Conduct Definitions of Plagiarism and Cheating.
12. Disorderly, lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct.
13. Extortion.
14. Breach of the peace on College property or at any College-sponsored or supervised function.
15. The use, sale, possession, or being under the influence of alcohol or any other controlled substance prohibited by law, on campus or at any function sponsored or supervised by the College.
16. Illegal possession or use of firearms, explosives, dangerous chemicals, or other weapons on College property or at College-sponsored activities.
17. Smoking and/or the use of tobacco products inside all campus buildings and other unauthorized campus areas.
18. Failure to comply with directions of College officials, faculty, staff, or campus security officers who are acting in performance of their duties.
19. Failure to identify oneself when on College property or at a College-sponsored or supervised event, upon the request of a College official acting in the performance of his/her duties.
20. Gambling.
21. Harassment (verbal or physical or sexual) of any student or member of the College community. (Harassment is defined as an activity which causes substantial emotional distress and serves no legitimate purpose.) (See **Policy 11C2** of this Manual for a definition of sexual harassment.)
22. Abuse of computer resources. (See **Policy 3E** of this Manual regarding Information Technology policies)
23. Abuse of or disruption to the student conduct and/or complaint process, including but not limited to:
  - i. Failure to obey the summons of a College official or appropriate committee.
  - ii. Falsification, distortion, or misrepresentation of information before a College official or appropriate committee.
  - iii. Disruption or interference with the orderly conduct of an official College proceeding.
  - iv. Attempting to influence the impartiality of a member of an official committee prior to and/or during the course of, an official College proceeding.
  - v. Harassment and/or intimidation of any person involved in the conduct and/or complaint process, prior to, during, and/or after the proceeding.
  - vi. Failure to comply with the sanction(s) imposed under the Student Conduct Code.
  - vii. Influencing or attempting to influence another person to commit an abuse of the conduct or complaint process system.
  - viii. Repeated filing of frivolous and/or capricious complaints against College personnel.
24. Hazing. (See Education Code Sections 32050 and 32051)
25. Violation of other applicable Federal, State, and local laws (e.g., hate crimes) and College rules and regulations.
26. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper behavior.
27. Assisting another person, or soliciting another person, in any of the offences listed in numbers 1 through 26 of this policy.
