Why are you running for this position?

As the creator of The University of Tampa Campus Senate Suggestion Page, which is going on its third year of submissions, I have been able to hear many suggestions from various students on what we should do to make this campus great. Keeping every individual post in mind here are some of the changes Kristin and I would like to bring to the campus for the 2014-2015 school year.

Some changes I would like to bring to the table as the Vice President of Student Government include:

- Renovation of the University of Tampa library including added spaces for group and individual studying.
- This past year senator Katelyn Edwards and I met with Black Casper (owner of The Oxford Exchange) and provided him with a tour of the library as a proposal for the Board of Trustees to invest in creating an space within our campus library that resembles an area similar to the Oxford Exchange. Java Bar included.
- More sustainable initiatives with and throughout the campus, included, yet not limited to:
- Creating a sustainability fund to spread across organizations such as the EPC, SEAC, Tri Beta, UT Entrepreneurs Sustainability Board, among others.
 - Creating a sustainable committee underneath the Student Government Body
- Providing the University of Tampa student body with a future green house where students may partake in gardening, agricultural experimentation, and developments in aquaculture and bio mimicry for some examples.
- Bringing more organic and nutritional food items to student body to enjoy health and wellness not only in food items, but also in exercise classes including yoga, as well as, meditation.

- Extended hours in all areas of campus life, included, yet not limited to:
 - Longer library hours
 - Longer on campus dining hours
 - Longer computer lab hours
- Improved campus dining
 - Advanced meal options
 - Larger meal selections
 - Themed dining nights
- Better Athletics and Student Body Spirit (including the initiative for a football team) (The University of Tampa used to have a football team back in the day and the program was shut down once the Tampa Bay Buccaneers came onto the scene. Now given that Tampa has experienced tremendous growth not only in university attendance, but also in the general Tampa community Kristin and I believe this would be a great time to put forward the proposal of a University of Tampa football team. We are talking much larger than just intermural here.)
 - Increased student body spirit
 - Better halftime shows at every sporting event
 - Enhanced giveaways and interactive themed events
- More attention given to student athletes and how their college lives and schedules are affected by being a college athlete.
- More attention given to student athletes families and involving them in our athletic functions
 - Increased involvement from the Tampa community in our athletics
- Increased attention given to student parking
 - More lax rules given to student parking in relation to the lack of spaces available
 - Fair treatment towards students with parking tickets
 - Lower ticket fares

Increased student social themed events and money allotted to hosting events like this. (Some examples would include the White Party Student Government put on this year)

- Greek Life
- Increased recognition given to Greek life and all the great things Greek organizations bring to the university.
- More social events put on by the university for Greek life so all chapters may attend and have a chance to get to know one another.

We would like to propose either free taxi rides for students, or a transportation system created specifically for UT Students.
