G'day Gov'nors!

I write to you today in a daze of glory, excitement and general sleep-deprivation. All year, the State Affairs Task Force has been working non-stop for you.

We created some massive waves with the fall term voter registration and get out the vote campaigns. We have used that momentum to surf our way into the State Capitol to tell the powers-that-be what is up.

The Associated Students of Oregon State University has had a strong presence in Salem since the beginning of the 2005 legislative session. During the first few weeks of the session, which convened Jan. 10, ASOSU representatives met with nearly 20 representatives and senators to inform them of the issues for which we were advocating (excuse me, DEMANDING).

This session, State Affairs is fighting for three priority issues. One, keeping the \$91.6 million (a 111 percent increase) that the Governor has proposed for the Oregon Opportunity Grant, the state's only need-based aid program, which would fund all eligible and even begin to help some part-time students.

Two, stopping our tuition rates from again increasing over the next two years, by insisting that the state begin to reinvest in our education. Rates have risen 53 percent at OSU over the last four years.

Finally, we must not forget the children. We are fighting to save the Student Childcare Program, which currently assists 230 full-time, low-income student-parents. We will fight to increase its budget by 50 percent to \$1.5 million to help another 115 families on a waiting list of over 700. All of our campaigns have been met with a mix of approval and

reluctance in Salem. Because the state faces a budget shortfall of over \$1 billion over the next two years it will be challenging to secure all the funding we need.

We need your help! We're under attack by ever-increasing, over-inflated, credit-financed tuition hikes! The Oregon University System is woefully under-funded, the Governor's investment into the Oregon Opportunity Grant is threatened, and the Student Childcare Program may be cut-again. There is a solution, however. The State Affairs TaskForce of the ASOSU and the Oregon Student Association are demanding that legislators increase the OUS budget by \$32 million, hold onto the money proposed for the OOG and move the SCCP out of the Dept. of Human Services. As someone who has benefited from an education at OSU and who has held a leadership position in the ASOSU, we would appreciate it very much if you would write a personal letter on the advantages you have gained from an affordable (or was it?) education, assistance from the Oregon Opportunity Grant, or the hardships of raising a family while furthering your education.

Letters-to-the-editors of your local paper, the Statesman-Journal, and/or the Oregonian would be very much appreciated as well.
